
## GENDER GAP


By saying that Gross Domestic Product (GDP) measures "everything in short, except that which makes life worthwhile", Robert Kennedy effectively admitted the intrinsic value of GDP: it conveys a lot of information, quickly, but not comprehensively.

Looking at data from 1960 to 2015, we noticed that there hasn't been much change in which countries make up the 10 largest economies in the world, although they add up to a smaller share of the global economy today than they used to. We also noticed that most of their leaders have been men. We counted 143 changes in leadership among the world's 10 largest economies since 1960 and only 8 involved a female leader.
